My Journey with Brush & Paint

It began some 50 years ago.

In college, starting out to become an architect, it only took a few life-drawing and one painting class to get me hooked. The opportunity to depict observations and emotions on a two-dimensional surface was all I suddenly wanted.

After graduating from Rhode Island School of Design in 1970, I wandered across the US in search of new images and inspirations. I found plenty, but I also could never quite set aside those old memories of my childhood in a war-torn Korea.

These images developed into a *BUD SERIES*, inspired by the birth of my second son and my daily observations of new beginnings all around us. These last few years I've been working on a series of *EARTH VASE* paintings .. the simple vase being a universal symbol of comfort across the ages. Just like a landscape.

In between these series of paintings, I use a good amount of my studio time depicting a few local folks. They now live on canvas forever.

Just as I have these past many years, I will continue to follow the rise and setting of the moon & sun. I will continue to face the restless wind and walk the beaches with my grandchildren. And, all the while, I will observe the cycles of the seasons and continue to capture the feeling of this extraordinary place on canvas.
